

. WHAT ARE SPIRITUAL GIFTS?

BIBLICAL BASIS - Romans 12:1-8

1 Corinthians 12

Ephesians 4:1-16

1 Peter 4:10-11

MEANING - charisma (Rom. 12:6; 1 Pet. 4:10; 1 Cor. 12:4): a gift of grace, a favor freely given

pneumatikos (1 Cor. 12:1): a thing of the Spirit

<u>PURPOSE</u> (1 Cor. 12:7 & 12-27; 1 Pet. 4:10) - for the common good (not for self-edification)

SOURCE (1 Cor. 12:4-7, 11) - the Triune God, particularly the Holy Spirit, as He wills

<u>DEFINITION</u> - A divine endowment of a special ability for service within the body of Christ

<u>DISTRIBUTION</u> (1 Cor. 12:7, 11) etc.) - at least one to every Christian (at conversion or any time subsequent to conversion as the Spirit wills)

DISTINCTION

- between the gift of the Spirit and gifts of the Spirit: the gift of the Spirit is what brings one into the body of Christ (1 Cor. 12:3); gifts of the Spirit equip one for service within the body
- between gifts of the Spirit and the <u>fruit</u> of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22-23): the fruit of the Spirit (love, joy, etc.) is produced in all Christians and has to do with character; gifts of the Spirit are distributed in differing amounts and combinations and have to do with service
- between our Christian responsibilities and spiritual gifts: all Christians have the responsibility to serve, exhort, teach, give, witness, etc., but to some the Holy Spirit gives a special aptitude (charisma) for exhortation, teaching, giving, witnessing, etc.
- between <u>natural talents</u> and <u>spiritual gifts</u>:
 natural talents are given to Christian and non-Christian alike;
 spiritual gifts are bestowed only upon Christians
 (Note: A natural talent may be changed by God into a spiritual gift, the
 difference being in the objective and motive for using the talent/gift)

NUMBER (1 Pet. 4:10) - as many as God in His grace determines to bestow

II. EXPLORING THE BIBLICAL EXAMPLES OF SPIRITUAL GIFTS

1. APOSTLE Ephesians 4:11; 1 Corinthians 12:28

A. Qualifications

What were the qualifications of an apostle? Acts 1:15-26

What special authority was given to them? John 14:25-26; 15:26-27 16:12-14; 1 Corinthians 14:37

What special powers did they have? 2 Corinthians 12:12; Hebrews 2:3-4

B. Definition

The gift of apostle is the special ability God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to speak with great authority in matters of faith and life by virtue of their intimate knowledge of Christ and direct revelation through the Spirit.

C. Duration

What does Ephesians 2:20 say about the gift of apostle?

Does this gift exist today?

2. PROPHET Ephesians 4:11, Romans 12:6, 1 Corinthians 12:10,29

A. What is a prophet?

In Old Testament times - Jeremiah 1:4-10

In New Testament times - 1 Corinthians 14 (esp. vv. 29-32)

Isaiah 53; Acts 11:27-30; 21:10-11 - What would prophets of both the Old and New Testament do on occasion?

Two tests of a true prophet:

- 1) Isaiah 8:20
- 2) Deuteronomy 18:18-22

The gift of prophet is the special ability which God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to receive and speak forth truth which has been given by direct revelation of God.

B. Is the gift of prophecy still present in the church today?

The answer of Pentecostals and charismatics: "Prophecy <u>is</u> the voice of the Spirit" (Donald Gee, <u>Speaking with Tongues and Prophesying</u>)

The answer of the Scriptures:

Hebrews 1:1-2 - How has God spoken to mankind?

3. DISCERNMENT | 1 Corinthians 12:10

A. Definition

How could the early Christians know that a person truly had the gift of prophecy? Here is where the gift of discernment came in. See 1 Corinthians 14:29-32; also 1 John 4:1; 1 Thessalonians 5:19-21

The gift of <u>discernment</u> is the special ability God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to determine whether a prophet is speaking under the impulse of the Holy Spirit, his own human spirit, or even an evil spirit.

B. Its importance to the early church

Why was such a gift imperative in the early days of the church?

What would have eliminated the continuing need for this particular gift?

C. For Discussion

- Though the spiritual gift of discerning the spirits may no longer be present today, all Christians still do need to use spiritual discernment. Why is careful discernment necessary when examining
 - a) the teachings of the cults?
 - b) the teachings of liberal theologians?
 - c) the teachings of conservative, "evangelical" churches?

- 2. How do we grow in our ability to "discern the spirits"?
- 3. Agree or Disagree? God wants Christians to be able to discern what motivates a person to do or say something.

4. EVANGELIST Ephesians 4:11 (also Acts 21:8; 2 Timothy 4:5)

- A. Acts 8:4-8, 26-40 Philip the Evangelist at Work
 - vv. 4-8 To whom was Philip proclaiming the Good News?
 - v. 26 What would this command mean for Philip?
 - vv. 27-34 What can we conclude about the man to whom Philip was sent?
 - v. 35 In one word, what was Philip's message to the eunuch?
 - vv. 36-38 What was the outcome of Philip's evangelistic work?

Compare with Matthew 28:19-20 - What are the two things involved in going and "making disciples"?

Some Conclusions:

Evangelism involves getting up and going out to people.

An evangelist is one who tells the Good News to those who are not yet trusting in Jesus as Savior.

The message of an evangelist is a simple one: Jesus.

An evangelist may work one-on-one or address a multitude.

The purpose of an evangelist is to make disciples through the use of Word and Sacrament

B. Definition

The gift of <u>evangelist</u> is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to present the Gospel clearly and convincingly especially to those who are not a part of the Body of Christ.

Marks of an evangelist (according to William McRae, <u>The Dynamics</u> of Spiritual Gifts):

- 1) he/she has a consuming passion for souls
- 2) he/she has a clear understanding of the Gospel
- 3) he/she has the ability to present the Gospel clearly
- 4) he/she has great joy in seeing people come to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ

Any difference between an evangelist and a witness (Compare Mark 5:19-20 with Acts 8:26-40)

- C. For Discussion Do you agree or disagree with the following statements?
 - 1. An extrovert makes the best evangelist.
 - 2. A lay person cannot possibly be as effective an evangelist as a pastor.
 - 3. If I see that I don't have the gift of evangelist, this excuses me from sharing my faith with others.
 - 4. Every Christian should be able to strike up a spiritual conversation with non-Christians at any time and in any place.
 - 5. Evangelism can best be done one-on-one.
 - 6. The best place from which to evangelize is the pulpit.

5. PASTOR-TEACHER Ephesians 4:11

- A. The last of the four equipping ministries of Ephesians 4:11-12
 - 1. Apostles proclaimed and wrote down the Spirit-inspired Word
 - 2. <u>Prophets</u> expounded that Word and from time to time received special Spirit-given Word for the early Church before the New Testament was completed
 - 3. <u>Evangelists</u> communicate the Gospel especially to those not yet Christians
 - 4. Pastors-Teachers apply the Word to those already Christian with the purpose of building up a believer's spiritual life (Note: In Ephesians 4:11-12 pastor and teacher are joined together as one gift, pastor-teacher. In 1 Corinthians 12:28 and Romans 12:7 teacher is listed separately. Pastor is never listed apart from teacher See 1 Timothy 3:2, "able to teach")

B. Meaning of "Pastor"

"Pastor" is from a Greek word meaning "shepherd" - see, for example, John 21:16, Acts 20:28-31; 1 Peter 5:1-5

The duties of a shepherd (Psalm 23):

C. The office of pastor-teacher

In the New Testament the title "pastor" as spiritual leader of a flock is found only in Ephesians 4:11. For other titles given to the leaders of Christ's flock in the New Testament church, see Titus 1:5-9

The key task of the pastor-teacher is the use of God's Word to guide, feed, and protect the flock. What happens when this is done faithfully? See Ephesians 4:11-12; 2 Timothy 3:14-17

The primary responsibility for Christian training or discipling within the church lies with those who have the gift of pastor-teacher or teacher.

D. <u>Definition</u>

The gift of <u>pastor-teacher</u> (shepherding) is the special ability that God gives to <u>certain members</u> of the Body of Christ to assume a personal responsibility for the spiritual welfare of another Christian or group of Christians.

E. For Discussion

- 1. Do you agree or disagree with the following statements?
 - a. Everyone called to the office of pastor has the gift of shepherding.
 - b. All elders should possess the shepherding gift.
 - c. It would be good to divide congregations into groups of 15-20 families, each under the care of one with the shepherding gift.

6. TEACHING Romans 12:7; 1 Corinthians 12:28, 29

A. The difference between teaching and prophecy in the early church

prophecy: revealed new truth from God

teaching: explained and applied the revealed truth of God

B. The difference between teaching and evangelizing

evangelist: message aimed chiefly at the unbeliever

teacher: message aimed chiefly at the believer

C. Definition

The gift of teaching is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to explain clearly and apply effectively the truth of the Word of God

"A person with the gift of teaching will be marked by two characteristics. He will have a keen interest in the personal study of the Word and in the disciplines involved in studying the Scriptures.... Also he will have the capacity to communicate clearly the truths and applications of the Word so that others may learn and profit. After you have heard a "teacher" teach, your response should be: 'I see what he means'" (The Dynamics of Spiritual Gifts)

D. The value for the Church of the gift of teaching

The gift of teaching is an ongoing need in the Church, both to build up spiritually the present generation and to pass on the body of Christian teaching to the generation to come.

For Discussion - Do you agree or disagree with the following statements?

7. EXHORTATION Romans 12:8

A. What this gift is

From the Greek word *parakaleo*: to call to one's side with idea of urging, appealing (Romans 12:1) or comforting, encouraging (2 Corinthians 1:3-5)

Look at 1 John 2:1; John 14:16; 2 Corinthians 1:3-5, noting especially the progression in the 2 Corinthians passage

B. Definition

The gift of <u>exhortation</u> is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to bring words of comfort and consolation, encouragement and counsel to other members of the Body in such a way that they feel helped and healed.

<u>Note</u>: The difference between the gift of exhortation and the gift of shepherding

C. A Biblical example of one with the gift of exhortation: Barnabas

D. The gift of exhortation today

- 1. How might this gift be used in a congregation?

8. THE WORD OF WISDOM and 9. THE WORD OF KNOWLEDGE 1 Corinthians 12:8

The last of the so-called speaking gifts
The "word of" = "the ability to speak with"

A. The gifts defined

knowledge = information (gained by personal experience)
wisdom = the right use of information to achieve proper ends
See 1 Corinthians 1:30 and 2 Peter 3:18. Where should we look for
the source of all true wisdom and knowledge?

Therefore we need to turn to the Bible for the ability to speak with wisdom and knowledge (John 5:39)

The gift of the <u>word of knowledge</u> is the special ability God has given to certain members of the Body of Christ to understand, take to heart, and systematize the great truths God has hidden in His Word.

The gift of the <u>word of wisdom</u> is the special ability God has given to certain members of the Body of Christ to relate and apply the truths of the Word to specific needs and problems of life.

B. The difference between the word of knowledge and the word of wisdom

knowledge: the ability to recognize the important and key facts of Scripture as a result of careful investigation

wisdom: the ability to apply these spiritual insights to specific situations

C. The relationship between the gift of teaching and the word of know-ledge and the word of wisdom

knowledge and wisdom: discovers spiritual facts and insights
teaching: passes on to others in learnable form these facts and
insights

D. For Discussion

- 1. How might the gifts of the word of knowledge and/or of wisdom help in a congregation?
- 2. Do you agree or disagree with the following statements?
 - a. One with the gift of knowledge would make a good teacher.
 - b. One with the gift of wisdom would make a good teacher.
 - c. In witnessing about Christ, the gift of knowledge is more important than the gift of wisdom.
 - d. If one has only the gift of knowledge but not of wisdom, he won't be of much good to anyone.
 - e. The gift of wisdom can't operate well apart from the gift of knowledge.

10. SERVING Romans 12:7

A. What the gift is

Romans 12:7 - from *diakonia* (deacon) = service (especially of those who execute the commands of others)

The gift of serving is the special ability that God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to work within the Church in any supportive role.

See 1 Timothy 3:8-13 - The office of deacon and the gift of serving (similar to the office of pastor and gift of shepherding, office of evangelist and gift of evangelism)

B. Biblical example of the gift of serving: Acts 6:1-6

The result of their service (v. 7):

One key purpose for the gift of serving:

- C. The gift of serving today Do you agree or disagree with the statements below?
 - 1. More Christians have the gift of serving than any other gift.

11. GIVING Romans 12:8

A. Biblical examples of the gift of giving

Acts 4:32-37

2 Corinthians 8:1-5

Mark 12:41-44

These all gave "with liberality" (without pretence, in all sincerity, generously)

B. Definition

The gift of giving is the special ability God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to contribute their material resources to the work of the Lord without ulterior motives and with great generosity.

C. Do you agree or disagree with the following?

- 1. A large percentage of Christians have the gift of giving.
- 2. A good way to discover if I have the gift of giving is to start giving much more than I'm giving now and then to examine how I feel about this.
- 3. One with the gift of giving is not so likely to ask, "How much should I give?" as, "How much do I need to keep for myself?"
- 4. A wealthy person is more likely to have the gift of giving than a poor person.
- 5. A wealthy person with the gift of giving will benefit the church more than a poor person with the same gift.
- 6. One who doesn't have the gift of giving can hardly be expected to tithe.

12. LEADERSHIP Romans 12:8; 1 Corinthians 12:28

A. The words for leadership

Romans 12:8 - prohistemi - to stand in front of, be over, superintend, preside over

Other Bible references: 1 Timothy 3:4,12; 5:17; 1 Thessalonians 5:12

1 Corinthians 12:28 - kybernesis - position of helmsman (Acts 27:11), a governing, government

Also *hegeomai* (Heb. 13:7,17,24) - to go before, lead, rule, command, have authority over;

and *episkopos* (1 Timothy 3:2; Titus 1:7) - overseer, one charged to see that things to be done by others are done rightly

Note: An episkopos (overseer, bishop) is no doubt the same person as a presbyteros (elder). The title episkopos emphasizes the function of the office--to lead, while the title presbyteros speaks of the dignity of the office--bestowed only upon those mature in the faith (see Acts 20:17,28 and Titus 1:5,7). Within the congregations of the early church it would appear that there were just two offices--over-seer/elder and deacon (see Philippians 1:1 and 1 Timothy 3:1,8).

B. New Testament qualifications for leadership

1 Timothy 3:1-7 -

C. <u>Definition</u>

The gift of <u>leadership</u> is the special ability God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to plan, organize, and administer the work of the Church with true spirituality, fairness, and diligence.

<u>Note</u>: Some look upon the gift of administration (1 Corinthians 12:28) as a gift distinct from the gift of leadership. It appears, though, that the two are virtually synonymous.

- D. For Discussion Do you agree or disagree?
 - 1. In a Christian congregation it is necessary that the pastor have the gift of leadership.
 - 2. A Christian who is a leader in a secular field will most likely also have the spiritual gift of leadership.
 - The real leaders in a Christian congregation are the elders.
 - 4. The idea of a church being governed by leaders conflicts with the Bible's teaching of the universal priesthood of believers.
 - 5. All elders possess the gift of leadership.
 - 6. A congregation governed by a board of elder-overseers is closer to the New Testament pattern than a congregation governed by a Voters' Assembly.

13. SHOWING MERCY Romans 12:8 (HELPS, 1 Corinthians 12:28)

A. The words describing this gift

Romans 12:8 - eleeo - to have mercy, compassion; feel sympathy, pity

Examples of its use: Matthew 9:27; 15:22; 17:15; 18:33; 20:30; Mark 5:19; Luke 16:24; Philippians 2:27; Ephesians 2:4; 1 Timothy 1:13

Mercy (eleos) is sympathy that shows itself in cheerful actions, not only words.

1 Corinthians 12:28 - antilempsis - to take someone's part, help, come to the aid of
Used also in Luke 1:54 and Acts 20:35

Its emphasis: deeds, helping those who can't help themselves

B. Definition

The gift of showing mercy (helps) is the special ability God gives to certain members of \overline{the} Body of Christ to feel genuine compassion for suffering individuals and to translate that compassion into cheerfully done Christlike deeds that help to alleviate the suffering.

The difference between the gift of mercy and of exhortation:

exhortation: helping with words

mercy: helping with deeds

C. For Discussion - Do you agree or disagree with the following?

- Those without the gift of mercy shouldn't attempt to keep an ill and incapacitated relative in their home.
- 2. Our congregation is giving its members sufficient opportunities to use their gifts of mercy.
- 3. Those suffering within our congregation are being properly ministered to by those who have the gift of mercy.
- 4. To help a congregation locate and use the gifts of mercy in its midst it will be good for it to have a Special Ministries Board or Committee.

14. FAITH | 1 Corinthians 12:9

A. What is meant by the gift of faith?

Not saving faith, which every Christian has Rather: 1 Corinthians 13:2 -

The gift of <u>faith</u> is the special ability God gives to certain members of the <u>Body</u> of Christ to see something that needs to be done and to believe that God will do it even if it looks impossible.

1 Corinthians 13:2 - Why is the virtue of love needed for one with the gift of faith?

B. For Discussion

- 1. How would the gift of faith help in a Christian congregation?
- 2. What is the difference between the gift of vision and being a visionary? Of trusting God and tempting God?
- 3. How does a congregation determine whether it should follow one who challenges it to "do the impossible" for God?
- 4. Why will those with the gift of faith often appear impractical to those without that gift?

5. Agree or Disagree? For a church to grow the pastor must have the gift of faith.

15. MIRACLES 1 Corinthians 12:10,28

A. What is a miracle?

1. Greek: dynamis (power)

teras (wonder)

semeion (sign)

- 2. A miracle is an act of supernatural <u>power</u>, God overturning the normal course of nature

 Examples: power over disease, demons, nature, matter, death
- 3. A miracle elicits <u>awe</u> and <u>wonderment</u> See Mark 2:12; 6:51; Luke 5:9
- 4. A miracle is a <u>sign</u>, authenticating the doer of the miracle as a divinely commissioned servant of the Lord See John 6:14; 14:11; Acts 9:42

B. Definition

The gift of miracles is the special ability God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to perform powerful acts that alter the course of nature, such acts serving to authenticate them and their message.

- C. The gift of miracles in the history of the church
 - 1. clustered around critical periods of history

the exodus

time of the prophets

life of Christ

the early church

In each case this gift authenticated a servant of God

2. possible today?

See 2 Corinthians 12:12; Hebrews 2:3-4 - Especially whom did miracle-working authenticate as divinely commissioned servants of the Lord?

D. Sign-seeking

16. HEALING 1 Corinthians 12:9,28,30

A. <u>Definition</u>

The gift of <u>healing</u> is the special ability God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to serve as intermediaries through whom it pleases God to cure illness and restore health apart from the use of natural means.

- B. The gift of healing according to the Bible
 - 1. Examples of Jesus' miracles of healing (25 mentioned):
 Mark 1:29-34, 40-42; 2:2-12; 3:1-5, 7-10; 5:25-43; 7:25-30,
 32-37; 8:22-26; 10:46-52
 Peter: Acts 3:1-11; 5:14-16; 9:32-43

Paul: Acts 14:8-10; 19:11-12; 20:7-12; 28:7-9

- 2. Some conclusions about New Testament healings:
 - a) believers and unbelievers were healed
 - b) healing was instant and complete
 - c) healing occurred with and without prayer requests
 - d) anyone who was brought was healed
 - e) included even raising from the dead
 - f) served to glorify God and authenticate the doer as sent from God

C. The "gift of healing" today

- 1. as compared with the gift of healing in New Testament times:
 - a) only believer healing
 - b) sometimes gradual and partial
 - c) only for those who seek it
 - d) some healed, others not
 - e) no power to restore life
 - f) often glorify the "healer" instead of God
- 2. how healings occur today
 - a) Psalm 50:15; James 5:14-15 (Mark 6:13)
 - b) special gifts of healing possible? Yes, but those who claim to have the gift today don't fit the New Testament pattern

D. The place of suffering in the Christian's life

1. The <u>false</u> claim of present day "healing" churches:

Those who are "in Christ" should be perfect in soul and in body since the curse of sin has been removed

- 2. the truth
 - a. no more condemnation, but still sinners (Romans 7:18ff); perfection only in heaven
 - b. our bodies, too, are still a part of this sinful world, subject to weakness and illness
 - 1) Genesis 3:16-19 Becoming a Christian doesn't-deliver a woman from the pangs of
 childbirth

deliver a man from tilling soil filled
with thorns and thistles

deliver men and women from sickness and death

(Examples of believers who were suffering illnesses: Isaac, Job, David, Trophimus (2 Timothy 4:20), Epaphroditus (Philippians 2:27), Timothy (1 Timothy 5:23), Paul (2 Corinthians 12:7)

- 2) bodily perfection only after the resurrection (1 Corinthians 15:49-54; Philippians 3:21)
 - 1 Corinthians 15:49 "Just as we have borne the image of the earthly, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly."
 - Philippians 3:21 "(The Lord Jesus Christ) will transform the body of our humble state into conformity with the body of His glory, by the exertion of the power that He has even to subject all things to Himself."
- 3. Why illness and suffering?
 - a. Romans 8:18 a reminder that our final redemption is still in the future
 - b. Isaiah 43:2 to help keep our trust centered in the Lord
 - c. Psalm 119:67 and 71; Hebrews 12:5 and 11 at times to lead us back to the Lord
 - d. 2 Corinthians 12:9-11 to make us more effective servants of the Lord
- 4. Conclusion
 - a. in sickness: pray for healing ask others to pray persist in prayers

if no healing, trust that the Lord's good purposes for you still are being served

- A. Historical background of the "tongues movement" in our country
 - 1906, revival in Azuza, California beginning of Pentecostal churches (Assemblies of God, etc.)
 - 2. 1960, tongues-speaking appears in some mainline Protestant bodies (Episcopalian, Lutheran, Methodist, Baptist, etc.), beginning of the charismatic (neo-Pentecostal) movement
 - 3. 1967, charismatic movement begins in the Roman Catholic church
 - 4. A charismatic Lutheran writes: "The charismatic movement cannot be reduced simply to speaking in tongues. Yet neither can it be understood or explained apart from tongues....It is no 'frill' or 'extra' in their Christian life—something which they could now take or leave depending on their mood." "Scripture doesn't say that speaking in tongues is the only sign of baptism in the Spirit. But Scripture gives us no consistent suggestion of any other."
- B. What is the gift of speaking in tongues?
 - 1. Found in four places: Acts 2:1-13; 10:44-47; 19:1-7; 1 Corinthians 14:2ff
 - 2. Definition

The gift of <u>speaking in tongues</u> is the special ability God gives to certain members of the Body of Christ to speak in another real language, but one not known by the speaker

The gift of interpretation is the ability to interpret the words of a person with the gift of speaking in tongues.

- 3. How one receives this gift
 - a. according to the Bible: 1 Corinthians 12:11 no prerequisites God gives as He wills
 - b. according to present-day charismatics
 - 1) water baptism
 - 2) obedience
 - 3) prayer
 - 4) fervent faith
- C. The purpose of the gift
 - 1. According to the Bible
 Acts 2:1-13; 10:44-47; 19:1-7; 1 Corinthians 14
 In the Book of Acts tongues' speaking authenticates the
 presence of the Holy Spirit; however, nowhere is it said
 that tongues' speaking is necessary for the Spirit's presence and working (compare Acts 13:52). In 1 Corinthians 14
 Paul strongly encourages prophecy but doesn't forbid tongues
 properly used for worship and self-edification.
 - 2. According to present-day charismatics

Speaking with tongues is the outward sign of "a fresh release or bestowal of the Holy Spirit which will be marked and manifest.... The issue of the experience is a vitalization of one's faith,...a signal breakthrough or release of the power of the Holy Spirit,...receiving power to live the Christian life more effectively and fruitfully"

- ---

D. Some biblical limitations on the gift

- 1. Tongues are not $\underline{\text{the}}$ sign of baptism in the Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:13 and 28).
- 2. Tongues are not needed to serve God effectively and with power (John 15:5).
- 3. No spiritual gift can be obtained by obeying a set of conditions (1 Corinthians 12:11).
- 4. Tongues are not the exclusive domain of Christianity (therefore 1 John 4:1).
- 5. Tongues are not necessarily the sign of maturity or spirituality (compare 1 Corinthians 3:1-3)
- 6. Tongues shouldn't be the basis for uniting Christians (Romans 16: 17; John 8:31).

E. Four conclusions

- 1. Accept tongues speaking as a New Testament gift present in at least some of the congregations (Acts 2, Acts 10, Acts 19, 1 Corinthians 14).
- 2. As far as tongues' speaking today is concerned, don't condemn all manifestations of it as wrong (1 Corinthians 14:39), but be sure to check it out carefully (1 John 4:1).
- 3. Trust that God will always give you what you need to live your Christian life to the full (John 10:10; Philippians 4:19).
- 4. Continue to place emphasis upon the clear proclamation of the Word (1 Corinthians 14:23-25).

As you reflect on the spiritual gifts you have tentatively discovered through the Spiritual Gifts Analysis, you will now want to find which ones truly are and which are not your gifts. To do this you might want to follow what has been called the "5 E's" of gift discovery:

- Step One: Explore the Possibilities. This you have been doing through the Bible study of our seminar. Study again for yourself the three key spiritual gift chapters in Scripture--1 Corinthians 12, Romans 12, Ephesians 4 and the Bible study portion of this seminar.
- Step Two: Experiment with As Many As Possible. If you do not try a particular gift you have tentatively discovered through the Spiritual Gifts Analysis, you will have a hard time knowing whether you have it or not. Volunteer to serve in an area of congregational work that can put your tentative gift into practice. The key is to get involved with each tentative gift area.
- Step Three: Examine Your Feelings. When you experiment with a gift and enjoy using it, that is a good sign. You should be happy in your service and also effective.
- Step Four: Evaluate Your Effectiveness. Spiritual gifts are meant to be used for the benefit of others. As you use your gift(s) you should see positive, though not necessarily fabulous, results taking place. If you are not seeing any results, you probably do not have that particular gift.
- Step Five: Expect Confirmation from the Body. Gifts are given to build up other members of Christ's Body. Other Christians will recognize your gift and give you confirmation of it. If you feel you have a gift but no one else is agreeing with you, you should take a close look to make sure you are on the right track.
- Note: Follow through each of these five steps with prayer that the Lord Himself will be the guiding and directing as well as motivating force in all your endeavors.
