### The Mission in Mississauga



Divine Peace to Cross of Life

Mississauga, Ontario, Canada

This is a well known saying, a saying that can be easily be spouted from a coaches mouth without even thinking. This saying might even be regarded by some as an empty cliché that overused by coaches. Even though it is true that one soul saved is an success, this cliché can on some level be relate to one congregation that is now relatively well-known for a Bible Soccer Camp. After a struggling mission closed its doors twenty years ago another mission with two locations have taken its place in the rapidly growing suburbs of Toronto, Ontario, Canada. In the mission in Mississauga that is now called Cross of Life, we can see God's divine peace, his persistent grace, and the power of the Holy Spirit which led his faithful people in their continued efforts in this rich mission field.

### Why Mississauga?

In the years following the split with Lutheran Church Missouri Synod (LCMS), our synod, the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Synod (WELS) was very eager to prove itself and to spread its wings in a way.

Following the severance of fellowship with Missouri, there of course was the realization we could no longer lean and depend on the Missouri Synod and we as a church would need to stand on our own two feet. There was a strong determination in our Synod to make up for lost time and to beginning serving our families in places where, prior to this, we had feared to tread. Chief among those places was the East Coast of the United States. An official slogan was adopted that said we would reach "every state by '78." <sup>1</sup>

The unofficial slogan of 'every state by '78' was accompanied by a zeal for mission work in the United States as well as expanding over the boarder into Canada. In the fledgling Colonial Conference of the Michigan District this missionary zeal was

certainly present, as the conference steadily grew and opportunities for ministry seemed to be sprouting up like buds, sprouts, and plants in a garden.

Out in my yard the crocuses are blooming, the tulips are up and should be in flower by the time you read this. The fruit trees are in full bud. The new growth that comes in spring is always wonderful to behold! As we savor the joys of Easter and look forward to the celebration of Pentecost it is a good time to survey some of the new growth and activity in our mission congregations. This growth comes not from the change of seasons, but by the resurrection of our Lord and through the powerful working of the Holy Spirit in the means of grace! <sup>2</sup>

Even though the WELS never reached their unofficial goal of every state by '78 that missionary zeal maintained momentum through the year 1978 and following, as interest in continued mission work was actively being explored all throughout the Synod, along the east coast of the United States, and into Canada.

Lengthening: The cords of the Colonial Conference are also being lengthened. The Lord is leading our conference to the northwest, to the Canadian city of Toronto. A group of pastors including Rev. T. Pfotenhauer of Ottawa, Canada, Rev. D. Priebe of Orleans, Canada, and Rev. W. Beckmann of Falls Church, Va. went to Toronto in December to inspect the field. Their investigation showed three or four families who are very interested. It is hoped that further investigation will reveal that this field, too, is ripe unto harvest.<sup>3</sup>

The field was certainly large enough as this area had been growing rapidly in the last few years. The town of Mississauga itself was established in 1974 and quickly became one of the fastest growing and most densely populated cities in the area. This area around Toronto area where Mississauga was situated was growing so quickly that it earned the moniker of

the "Golden Horseshoe".<sup>4</sup> As both lay people and pastors investigated prospects in this area it was determined that this growing area had the potential to support a mission.

Preliminary work in the Toronto area was done by Mrs. Judy Foulger of Brampton, Ont. In the winter of 1977, Pastors Beckman, Pftonhauer and Priebe traveled to Toronto to canvass the area. By September of 1978, other Wisconsin Synod members had been contacted and the small nucleus was granted exploratory status by the General Board for Home Missions.<sup>5</sup>

With both joy and uncertainty further efforts in the Toronto/Mississauga area were pursued.

We also have reason for joy among us because what is happening in our missions, really serves to advance the Gospel. Opposition to the Gospel is still common. There are seeming setbacks encountered. There is immediate concern when a familiar pastor is called to shepherd another flock. Some discouragement is felt when our people must wait for manpower to be authorized. There is a certain amount of disappointment when building efforts are delayed or halted temporarily. But we have reason for joy because we know that what is happening in our missions really serves to advance the Gospel... Exploratory status and manpower were requested in Toronto, Canada. 6

### **Divine Peace**

As mission status was granted in places like Trumbull, Connecticut, and Asheville, North Carolina, this region of our Synod was given grace filled persistence as they toiled through the ups and downs of mission work. Carried by the joy of advancing the message of Christ, thoughts of mission work in the growing area of Toronto were included in the believing hearts and minds of the Colonial Conference. Lay people and pastors continued to try to make contacts and bring the good news to others. They canvassed the area and soon pastors and vicars from established congregations in Ottawa came to minister to these people in the Toronto area, holding monthly services starting in January of 1979.

Immediately the need to bring a full time missionary to the Mississauga area was felt and acted upon. Calls were sent out and declined. "Another call for a man to serve as District Missionary and to begin exploratory work in Toronto, Canada is to be extended soon." After a few months of delegation, prayer, and processing through customs a man was led to come to Canada as an answer to that call. That man was Roy Hefti a recent graduate from Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary.

> Following the red tape necessary to gain entrance to Canada, Pastor Hefti and his wife, Alice, arrived in Canada on Sept 19, 1979. On October 7, Pastor Hefti was ordained and installed by Pastor Pfotenhauer at the Mississauga Vallev Community Centre. The first regular worship service was conducted on October 14, 1979.



After experiencing some initial growth, this group of souls went from meeting at the Mississauga Valley Community Centre and began to meet in the parsonage of Pastor Hefti. This small mission in Mississauga now began to formerly gather together as a congregation, called Divine Peace. As their numbers grew they moved from one parsonage to another larger rented house on 4340 Creditview Rd. in Mississauga. In February of 1982, Divine Peace again outgrew their current arrangement of combined parsonage and worship facility and began worshiping in the Britannia Secondary School until a another more suitable and permanent place could be found. During this time membership was around 35 souls and average

attendance was 23 per Sunday. The progress was certainly encouraging, and this lead Divine Peace to search for their own permanent home. To build their own facility at this time would have been an insurmountable task in view of the land in that area was a hot

commodity and prices for just an acre of land in 1982 would run as high as \$500,000. Knowing this they searched for an existing facility until the Lord led them to find an old World War II vintage building that used to serve as a lodge hall and church hall. The plan was to remodel this building and make it into the permanent chapel for Divine Peace. <sup>10</sup>

From all reports things seemed to be going quite well for this small Canadian congregation. Unfortunately several changes in the near future would factor into the closing of Divine Peace's doors. It is not exactly clear how this mission went from promising one to closed one in less than five years. However, several factors have to be considered when trying to piece the history of the unfortunate decline of a mission in a town that was growing so quickly. One factor was the type of area that this mission was in. Pastor Hefti himself referred to the "transient nature of life in the big city" and how "members come and go due to job transfers, etc." Other factors were simply how far removed this mission was from the rest of the district and the Synod, and the subsequent shortage of support which was felt and expressed by members of the conference. Even though this conference soon became its own entity with the formation of the North Atlantic District, this was still a very young district that was spread out over a large region. One more possible factor was revealed in the same article of the Colonial Conference Crier that announced the plans for a new chapel for Divine Peace. Immediately after Pastor Hefti's article on the chapel for the Golden Horseshoe the editor noted that Pastor Hefti had recently accepted a call to Bangor, Wisconsin. 12 All these challenges and changes seemed to be a bit too overwhelming for this "struggling group of 35 souls". Despite the efforts of the new pastor, Michael Enderle, who was ordained and installed on September 5<sup>th</sup>, 1983,

that maybe the Synod and the church in its enthusiasm had bit off more than they could chew with this congregation as well as others along the East Coast in the Colonial Conference, and therefore could no longer maintain certain congregations such as this one.

An official slogan was adopted that said we would reach "every state by '78." I always assumed it was the Home Mission department that was largely responsible for that promotional slogan. Slogans, of course, can often be helpful. When it came to the East Coast, however, it may have caused us to move into certain areas prematurely, with little understanding of our appreciation for the culture of those we would need to serve if we were to survive in those areas. The presence of a few WELS or former WELS families could not always carry the day. <sup>13</sup>

In September of 1985, about two years after Divine Peace had installed its second pastor in its short history, the mission was dissolved.

Divine Peace, Mississauga, Ontario, Canada has experience some program changes this year. The congregation first received Mission Status in 1979. In September of 1985 the BHM authorized the congregation to sell its Anne Street facility (closing set for August) and to relocate in a growth area under new mode principles. In April Pastor Enderle began working as a Mission Explorer in South Erin Mills. A decision concerning continuation will be made by the DMB to the BHM after one year. <sup>14</sup>

And the official end of the exploratory mission would be noted in the next North Atlantic District Convention:

### Not Now - But Soon

Even though this particular exploratory mission closed its doors work continued in other areas around the Toronto, as the area continued to grow. Other missions took root and within ten years we as a synod would be led back to the fertile mission field of Mississauga to bring a message of Christ's cross of life.

Mississauga, ON

Already in 1979 it was clear that metropolitan Toronto was a great city with many people living in darkness. After two pastors and seven years of work in Mississauga, it was clear the Lord was saying, "Not now." A new field in a different part of Toronto with a new team in 1987 was blessed by the Lord. And ten years later, in 1997, we returned to Mississauga at a new time with a new team and the Lord has blessed the work. <sup>16</sup>

During that time both the WELS and the North Atlantic District grew and learned from their past efforts to expand they maintained their mission mindedness. Throughout the 80's and into the 90's our synod and one of its newest districts continued to see and plan for opportunities to spread God's Word. The North Atlantic District in particular continuously noted opportunities in and around the big city of Toronto and worked to improve the way they approached mission work examining both positive and negative aspects of their mission programs. One particular helping trend was the idea of team ministry that was designed to support and sustain young and "struggling" missions.

Our Toronto plan is built around a team ministry that we are attempting to establish there. Once that is in place and the added manpower is acclimated, we will work energetically with our Toronto area congregations and missionaries to develop a plan for expanding our WELS presence in the greater Toronto area. We are still awaiting the Lord's providing of the second man for the team ministry at Markham.

Since we do have new ministries and manpower in the North Atlantic and also a fair number of "struggling" missions, we continue to discuss ways that we can proactively help our missions and missionaries either to be better equipped as missionaries or to assist them with specific problems. While we do not presume to have all the answers, we want you to know that we are willing to listen and assist in whatever way we can. We have many helpful tools and resources at our disposal. We have District Commissions who are willing to assist us but are often underutilized. Often we aren't aware of specific problems until they have done considerable harm to the local congregation. Please help us to help you. 19

During these proceedings and plans for the Toronto area an unsuspecting vicar is present. Joel Schulz who was serving as vicar at King of Kings, Clifton Park, N.Y is listed as a special guest of the convention.<sup>20</sup> In 1999, Joel would receive the call to be the pastor at a new exploratory mission in Mississauga.

Meanwhile mission work was still being done in the Toronto area. Even though Divine Peace Evangelical Lutheran Church, Mississauga had closed its doors in 1987, those who remained continued to faithfully serve the Lord and share the good news of Christ in that ever growing region of Mississauga. Some of these souls began working with another local WELS pastor, Pastor Doug Priestap who was called into the area to begin helping Pastor Tom Haar in another area east of Toronto. In 1990 Pastor Priestap began doing mission work in the town of Bolton, Ontario, which is about 23 km away from Mississauga. Soon Pastor Priestap began reaching out to the town of Oakville (population 127,000). Together with some of the souls who were being served in the first Mississauga mission, he began gathering prospects in this city, which is just west of Mississauga.

In 1994 this group of souls in the Oakville/Mississauga began to meet together for Bible Studies. They met in two homes of Margerite Rouleau, and Roberto and Denise

Tempsta. This group began calling themselves, "Cross of Life". This newly forming church body was in need of a pastor. At this time, Pastor Priestap was still living in Bolton where he and his family had a home and would regularly make more than an hour drive down to Oakville. The synod took note of the possibilities in Oakville and helped this group rent a storefront building in downtown Oakville. This group used this storefront to offer religious and Biblical literature to the community as a way of being able to share the gospel as well as establishing contacts with the community. This storefront also served as the regular worship center for the 25 members of Cross of Life and its visitors. After establishing this worship center it was not long before a fulltime missionary would be among them.

Cross of Life at Oakville served by Pastor Doug Priestap and Mississauga. We have been calling for Mississauga and are still awaiting the Lord's filling of this call. Initially the new man will work with Pastor Priestap in a team ministry at Oakville and then gradually shift his emphasis over to Mississauga.<sup>23</sup>

On the surface one could throw out the cliché, "If at first, you don't succeed try, try again." But in this case it was more like the saying that is sometimes knit into pillows and or can be viewed embroidered and framed, "When God closes a door, he opens a window." And even though the doors of Divine Peace in Mississauga closed nearly over a decade before, God in his grace allowed the windows of opportunity to remain wide open. And in another act of God's grace the doors of a new exploratory mission in Mississauga would open again in 1999. In August of that year, this group of believers who were gathering together in Oakville had a new pastor for this new Mississauga mission. Joel Schulz was ordained by his father-in-law Pastor H.

Koelpin on August 15<sup>th</sup>, 1999, <sup>24</sup> and began to conduct services at a nice rented facility in the Living Arts Centre, a civic center in the middle of Mississauga.<sup>25</sup>

There had been a debate between keeping the mission in Oakville or in moving to Mississauga, but the same sort of tremendous growth and opportunity in Mississauga that lead to the first mission in the 1970's was certainly still present in the 1990's stretching into the new millennium. Pastor Schulz in a report written in July of 2000 noted the continued growth in this area calling Mississauga the fastest growing city in Canada and possibly even all of North America.

Mississauga had 152,186 people in 1970, 298,045 people in 1980, 446,000 people in 1990, 574,200 people in 1998, and an estimated 588,500 people now. It is projected that there will be 618,000 people here by 2001, 652,900 people by 2006, 676,100 people by 2011, 711,800 by 2021, and 745,400 by 2031. The growth certainly looks to continue steady for a long time. <sup>26</sup>

Mississauga had become more than a bedroom community or a suburb or Toronto, it had become a "growing, diverse, multi-cultural city", with just about as many people who were commuting from Toronto as there were commuting to Toronto. It was understood that this was indeed a rich mission field not only because of the numbers of people that were coming in, but because of the type of people that were making this area grow. Many different types of people with many different backgrounds and cultures were moving in and many of them were unchurched, needing to hear about their Savior. One area pastor told Pastor Schulz, that if ten percent of Mississauga actually went to church on Sunday morning there would not be room for them in the church buildings here.<sup>27</sup>

All this was the same type of report that was received in the late 1970's. Mississauga was growing, there were many people who were from many different backgrounds, and an alarming large amount of the people there were unchurched. So why would another mission work this time? It seemed that the situation around Mississauga had not changed that much, but the circumstances around the synod and the district had changed – they were older more experienced and better equipped to support a mission like this one. Seeing the challenges before him, Pastor Joel Schulz, recognized the need for more than just one pastor to reach out to thousands and noted and the need for a missionary team and respectfully requested added support.

Throwing one pastor into Mississauga to reach its thousands of lost would be like one soldier landing on Normandy beach on D-Day... We could obviously use a "ministry team" here in Mississauga. (I realize that most likely, so could everybody at all of our other missions. I do not ever intend to assert that we have a greater need here or deserve more help). But if it is the Lord's will that more manpower could be made available for our mission work here to meet these needs, I would suggest a few of the following possibilities... a pastor, teach staff or lay minister... Any help that we could get could be used in some way or other to multiply our efforts to reach the lost here. 28

By the year 2000 there were an estimated 588,5000 people in Mississauga. But we had seen before that just because this mission was in a large and growing area it didn't guarantee growth for this WELS congregation. In fact before this congregation could really make an impact on the community it was trying to serve it would have to move in among its people. So before they could fight the battle of trying to sustain a young mission they would have to be put on the front lines. Therefore, seeing continued growth was happening away from the downtown area, the worship location at the downtown living arts center, though nice, was starting to feel removed from where the people were. And when

needed a new location. The Lord blessed the members of Cross of Life by helping them find a public school which was right in the middle of their target area and was willing to rent out their gym for Cross of Life's worship location. Therefore early in 2001, Lisgar Public School, which is only about block away from the location of the new parsonage and church office, became their place of worship. During the first month at Lisgar new visitors came to visit Cross

Learning from their past experiences and recent observations the synod, Pastor Joel Schulz, Cross of Life, and its members went ahead with a vision of how this mission could be sustained. Cross of Life faithfully proclaimed the gospel of Jesus Christ to its neighbors while benefiting from programs and organizations such as Mission Partners<sup>30</sup>, Travel

Canvass Witness, and WELS Kingdom Workers. In 2003 Cross of Life would also receive help and added manpower through the synod's staff ministry program, when Mr. Kevin Walker was installed on September 7<sup>th</sup> of that year. All these external programs supplied Cross of Life with the extra manpower and aid that had not been available to Divine Peace and that was needed to build bridges reaching out to the

Aided by the aforementioned organizations and programs, as well as the synod itself, Cross of Life also energetically planned and put on extensive and creative outreach programs to make contacts and create evangelistic opportunities with more of its neighbors. Many of these outreach programs were geared toward children because this area had more

kids age seven and under than any other Toronto neighborhood. And after having several successful one-day programs such as a Christmas 4 Kids, Pastor Schulz came up with an idea that would promote more long term contacts. The idea was a week long soccer/Bible camp. This camp would intertwine soccer and the Bible truths and be staffed by coaches and helpers from the congregation and others recruited by WELS Kingdom Workers.<sup>31</sup> The camp would consist of soccer drills and games at the beginning of the day then toward the middle of the day the coaches and children would all assemble together and hear a about the game of soccer and God's Word. Using creative themes, that are a little bit different every year, Pastor Schulz through these daily devotions<sup>32</sup> helps children learn about the game they love and also the God that loves them.

This camp's theme this year is "Soccer is My Game – Jesus is My life." Being a Bible-teaching church, we also again plan to share the message of God's love with the children who participate. This camp serves as a sort of vacation Bible school as well. Besides helping them pass and dribble better, we plan on sharing with them the amazing way that God showed his love to us by sending Jesus to give us real life! We will be using soccer to show many parallels between that game and the important game of life with God. 33

This camp was a huge success from the very beginning. More than 80 different children from all around this densely populated suburban community came to the first camp held in 2001, and learned about soccer and their Lord. The Camp remains a large part of Cross of Life's outreach efforts. It builds relationships that renewed yearly and encourages involvement from those who are already members. "One family we met through our soccer camp has already hosted coaches for the next year's camp. God has blessed us with this unique

opportunity to share the gospel with the families in our neighborhood."<sup>34</sup> The camp continues to thrive with the numbers for the 2006 camp reaching 170 kids with the numbers for the 2007 camp expected to exceed that. This camp has also made an impact throughout the synod, as other congregations have also benefited from sort of a camp template that Pastor Schulz has made available.<sup>35</sup>

This soccer camp has helped Cross of Life a great deal in establishing a name for the church in the community and supplying this mission with rich opportunities to share the gospel. Through kind of contact with the members of the community and the opportunity to share with them God's grace in Christ, God has done wonderful things for this congregation. Since 2001, the year of the first soccer camp, the size of Cross of Life has quadrupled. Cross of life has grown from 30 souls in the year 2000 to 112 souls today. <sup>36</sup>

As this congregation, by the grace of God, continues to grow and bring the gospel to this large and growing community Cross of Life also continues to make strides to make sure it remains a permanent fixture in the Mississauga area. In 2005 efforts were made to buy land and explore the possibilities of building a worship facility of their own. A piece of land was even picked out, but after the price of the land was raised once again these discussions fell through. But that did not deter Cross of Life from continuing to branch out.

As Mississauga continues to grow so grows the more scenic and less developed area around it. The area of Milton a nearby community has shown noticeable growth. Because of the continued expansion from the Toronto and Mississauga areas many have searched for another place that is a bit more removed from the big city have resulted in growth in the city of Milton. More and more people have been coming into the area, more and more

people who need to hear the good news of Jesus Christ. Cross of Life led by the Holy Spirit has continued to reach out to these people with the divine peace that comes through Christ. Initial contacts for this work in Milton have been made through the outreach programs like the Bible/soccer camp, through members who have moved their homes to the city of Milton, and through personal and public invitations to come and worship.



Despite not having their own facility and having to worship in a rented space, Cross

developed a unique kind of worship service that blends both contemporary and liturgical aspects. Members and visitors enjoy singing, praying, and reading while staring up at images of inspiring pictures and words projected on a canvas divider in a gym, reading from the Christian Worship, listening to soloist or choir, or simply singing a more "traditional" hymn. In their worship service it is clear that the members of Cross of Life do their best to praise their Lord. And in September of 2006, Cross of Life began offering this same type of weekly gospel

proclaiming worship service at a local community center in Milton.

Forty-five people attended the first service on Sunday, and attendance since then has been around 20-25 people.<sup>38</sup>

The Lord continues to bless Cross of Life in both

Mississauga and Milton, as Cross of Life is on the brink of
shedding its mission status and becoming self-sustaining.

Cross of Life is continually setting their sights on finding

a permanent facility even though land is hard to come by. As of February 2007, Cross of

Life will be entering a bid somewhere in the ballpark of 1.8 or 2 million dollars for a two acre piece of land with a very usable church building on it. 39 With the continued growth of the area and Cross of Life it seems only a matter of time before additional staff will be called upon to help carry on the work in this area. Only God knows what is in store for this congregation and the start of sister mission in Milton, Ontario, Canada.

The work in this area is not easy and many things keep this church from growing even more. The biggest opponent to this work is the devil. The devil is no stranger to Canada and his work as prevalent here as it is anywhere turning the hearts of unbelievers away from the truths of God's Word as well as leading believing members of Cross of life away. Other barriers that the devil uses to slow down the work of the gospel take the form of culture and religion. The diversity of world religions is a tough obstacle to overcome in such a culturally diverse area. In additional the Canadian Churches have turned many off to spiritual affairs and have fostered a general distrust and disdain for any church. It has become very hard to approach people about faith, and it takes a long time to build relationships and figure out a way to get the Gospel to them. All this has seemed to cultivate a general spiritual ecumenism and a tendency to gravitate towards an attitude of indifference. "We all believe in the same God" is the common sentiment of a area filled with Muslims, Buddhists, and other world religions. The basic challenge therefore is to let people know this wonderful message which God has given to us. 40

As this area continues to grow may the Lord continue to bless Cross of Life, Pastor Schulz, Staff Minister Walker, and all those who labor for the Lord in the Mississauga area both in the present and future. May the Lord be with them as they face both blessings and challenges in order to bring the wonderful message of Christ to this extensive mission field.

Mission status and manpower were requested for the mission nucleus at TKUM-BULL, CT. Attendance is about 20. Four persons are in instruction class. Thirtyfive prospects were uncovered by summer vicar Martin Albrecht and the Lutheran Collegian canvass/witness team. Exploratory status and manpower were requested in TORONTO, CANADA. The mission nucleus at ASHEVILLE, N.C., has exploratory status. The fourth call for a District Missionary (mission starter), whose work would begin at Asheville, has been extended.

HOPE of SYRACUSE, N.Y., has selected a church site. GOOD SHEPHERD of RUMFORD, R.I., has been renovating and repairing their church building. ASCENSION congregation has moved to a new place of worship in HARRISBURG, PA.

In addition, note the articles in this issue of the  $\underline{\text{Crier}}$  that speak of new church buildings and manpower.


New Buds and Shoots in Our Mission Congregations

The Lord made good use of the faithful service of His called worker, Pastor David Clark, who labored for 3½ years on behalf of St. Paul congregation, Nashua, NH. Pastor Clark preached his last sermon on August 19, and is now serving at Hope. Detroit, MI.


The Lord also blessed us with the assistance of Summer Vicar Thomas Nass, who helped with canvassing and evangel-

ism follow-up work in our Colonial Mission District this summer.

The Lord, by means of the Gospel of the crucified and risen Savior, inspires our missionaries and lay witnesses to give themselves fully to the work of mission outreach. Eight hundred homes were visited by the members of Ascension, Harrisburg, PA, in preparation for their Vacation Bible School. Twenty-two hundred homes were visited by DMLC graduates, Miss Bea Becker and Mr. Lennard Punke, while they were assisting with the VBS outreach program at Gethsemana, Raleigh, NC. Five or six lay people have been coming out on Monday nights to help with the work of evangelism at St John's of Christiana, Delaware.

The Lord also deserves all the credit for moving the members of the WELS to provide land and facilities for our missions. Land search is under way at Ascension, Harrisburg, PA. An offer to purchase has been made on a site that features a vacant bank building and home in Amherst, NH. The cost of preparing the two buildings for use by St. Paul congregation is being studied. Cross of Christ, Syracuse, NY, is engaging an architect. The first worship facility of St. John's, Christiana, DE, was dedica-

being lengthened. The Lord is leading our conference to the northwest, to the Canadian city of TORONTO. A group of pastors including Rev. T. Pfotenhauer of Ottawa, Canada, Rev. D. Priebe of Orleans, Canada, and Rev. W. Beckmann of Falls Church, Va. went to Toronto in December to inspect the field. Their investigation showed three or four families who are very interested. It is hoped that further investigation will reveal that this field, too, is ripe unto harvest.

Canada's capital city, OTTAWA, like every other large city is seeing a population shift to the suburbs. Because of this, ST. PAUL'S LUTHERAN CHURCH of Ottawa has already mothered one daughter congregation in the western suburbs, and is now considering establishing another mission in the eastern suburbs. Twelve families to the east of Ottawa may form the next congregation of the Colonial Conference as the cords are lengthened.

Also to the south the tents of God's Church are being extended. Four families from ASHEVILLE and HENDERSONVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA, are requesting Wisconsin Synod services in the western part of their state. Newspaper advertising is being done in Asheville and meetings are being held with mission board representatives in hopes that exploratory services can be started.



### **WELS** in Canada

From time to time the CRIER would like to introduce its readers to the specific congregations of the Colonial Conference. In this issue, we feature the WELS churches in Ontario Canada.

### St. Paul's Ottawa, Ontario

The First Evangelical Lutheran St. Paul's Church was constituted on November 14, 1874. Its founders were immigrants to Ottawa from the province of Pomerania in Prussia after the Franco-Prussian War of 1870-71. It was indeed the "first" Lutheran church in Ottawa, and has from the beginning been located on the corner of King Edward and Wilbrod Street.



The congregation joined the Missouri Synod in 1878, and always played a prominent part in the affairs of the Canada District. In 1969, however, St. Paul's was forced to withdraw from the Missouri Synod in protest over the synod's altar and pulpit fellowship with the American Lutheran Church. One year later it affiliated with the Wisconsin Synod.

St. Paul's has been a mother to several churches in the capital area. Most lecently it helped start up Abiding Word in Orleans and Divine Word in Mapean, and has contributed to the work being done in Pembroke and Toronto.

Pastor Thomas C. Pfotenhauer has shepherded the flock of St. Paul's since 1054.

### **Divine Peace**

### Mississauga (Toronto) Ontario

Divine Peace of Mississauga is a relative new-comer to the Canadian scene. Preliminary work in the Toronto area was done by Mrs. Judy Foulger of Brampton, Ont. In the winter of 1977, Pastors Beckman, Pfotenhauer and Priebe travelled to Toronto to canvass the area. By September of 1978, other Wisconsin Synod members had been contacted and the small nucleus was granted exploratory status by the General Board for Home Missions.

In January of 1979, monthly services were begun by the pastors and vicar from Ottawa. As of March 28, 1979, three calls for a pastor had been extended and returned. It was decided that a divine call would be extended through the assignment committee of the Seminary. On May 21, 1979, the call was received and accepted by candidate Roy W. Mefti, originally of La Crosse, Wisconsin.

Following the red tape necessary to gain entrance to Canada, Pastor Hefti and his wife, Alice, arrived in Canada on September 19, 1979. On October 7, Pastor Hefti was ordained and installed by Pastor Pfotenhauer at the Mississauga Valley Community Centre. The first regular worship service was conducted on October 14, 1979.

Due to lack of storage and other factors, it was decided to move our worship services to a more permanent type of arrangement—aparsonage—worship facility. A large house resting on two-and-a-half acres of land at 4340 Old Creditview Road was subsequently rented. For the next two years, from Feb. 29, 1980, to Feb. 27, 1982, the parsonage—worship facility served the needs of our small congregation.

Due to a pleasant lack of space at the Creditview facility, Divine Peace has now separated the worship facility and parsonage. Pastor Hefti now resides with his wife and two children at 1051 Cedarglen Gate, Unit #39, Mississauga, Ontario, Canada L5C 3A7, Phone: (416) 272-4825. Although we had originally intended to have a rather permanent worship set—up in a nearby office building, the offer to lease fell through at the last moment due to stringent fire—code regulations. Divine Peace now meets at the


Britannia Secondary School at 100 Elm Drive in Mississauga, at 10x30 a.m. each Sunday. This rather satisfactory arrangement that we have at the school was long-shot. Out of the 135 schools in the area, there is not a single opening at present, nor were there any but this one at the very time we needed it. We are also at the only school or community centre which has only one religious group meeting in it on a Sunday. The Lord has shown once again how powerful and merciful He is to His children.

Attendance and membership in the last two years have gone up and down due to the transient nature of life in the big city. Members come and go due to job transfers, etc. Our growth has therefore been slow but steady. Our present baptized membership stands at 32; communicant membership at 21, and average attendance at 23. The Lord has richly blessed Divine Peace through His precious Gospel. It is our fervent prayer that He may continue to do so and that Divine Peace may progress from exploratory status to mission status and beyond.

### Abiding Word Orleans, Ontario

Abiding Word Ev. Lutheran Church in Orleans, Ontario, is a mission church about ten miles east of Ottawa, Canada's capital. The congregation was organized in 1974, and the building was dedicated on 21 January 1979. We are 123 souls (76 communicants). The average age of the people in the congregation is 21 years, which means that we have many young parents and many small children. In fact, there are 14 children on the cradle roll and 11 in nursery class. It makes for some very interesting church services! Fortunately, we also have several older families who can help out. and since four families have sets of trains, help is certainly welcome. Presently, the parents are trying to organize some type of baby-sitting arrangement during the worship service, but we are finding that with so many little children the logistics are rather diffi-

Since we are in a rapid-growth area, there is plenty of evangelism work to do here, and the congregation is very interested in outreach. There are about



45,000 people in our area, which is about two-thirds of the planned population for the area. Because most of the people are connected with the government or the military, the population is very transient (1 to 3 years is the average stay). This accounts, for the most part. for the fact that last year we gained 30 people - and lost 28! Such movement is certainly excellent for the spread of the Gospel, and is also excellent for promoting outreach awareness at home. It is hard to be overly concerned about "ourselves" when "ourselves" spans from Australia to Cameroon, as well as throughout Canada and the U. S.

### Redeemer Pembroke, Ontario

One hundred miles west of Ottawa, on the Trans Canada Highway, is the town of Pembroke, population 15,000. Among those 15,000 is a high concentration of Lutherans, so in the mid-seventies Pastors Pfotenhauer from Ottawa and Priebe, then pastor in Orleans, began exploratory services in Pembroke. In 1978, a small church building was purchased on the corner of McKenzie and Coolidge Streets.

Pastor Frederic Zarling served the congregation on a full-time basis from February '79 till September '81. Other than that, the flock has been served by the pastors and vicars in the Ottawa area, most currently by Pastors Lindke and Spreeman.

Since the congregation numbers less than a dozen communicants at this time, it is supported in part by St. Paul's congregation in Ottawa.



### PASTOR DAVID KEHL

Pastor Kehl was a 1979 graduate of our Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary and is now serving Good Shepherd Lutheran Church of Rumford, Rhode Island.

He was born in Ixonia, Wisconsin, where his father was the principal of the Lutheran elementary school.

He prepared for the seminary by attending Northwestern Preparatory School and Northwestern College in Watertown, Wisconsin. He served two years as a graduate tutor at Northwestern with dormitory and classroom duties. St. John's of Redwood Falls, Minnesota was his first parish.

His wife, Joan, is originally from the North Atlantic District territory. Her parents have been members of 3 of our mission congregations. Joan is also a graduate of Wisconsin Lutheran College in Milwaukee and Dr. Martin Luther College in New Ulm, Minnesota.

Their daughter, Heidi, was born in November of 1983.

### A CHAPEL FOR THE GOLDEN HORSESHOE

Mississauga is part of the "Golden Horseshoe", as the densely populated southern part of Ontario is sometimes called. Within a 50 mile radius of Mississauga itself, there are some 4.5 million people. This fast-paced suburb of Toronto dubs itself "The City of Tomorrow."

2 And now, the Golden Horseshoe, and Mississauga in particular, has a chapel which Divine Peace Evangelical Lutheran Church can call home.

It is not a new structure. For a struggling group of 35 souls to build a new facility at this time would be an insurmountable task in view of land prices in the area which run as high as \$500,000 per acre.

So the Lord in His mercy provided Divine Peace with an alternative: a WW II vintage building formerly used as a lodge hall and church hall. Through a CEF loan the building was purchased at a cost of \$65,000, and at the time of writing, we are discussing with the General Board for Home Missions just how much money will be allocated for the remodelling project.

No date has been set for dedication yet, but readers of the <u>Crier</u> will be informed when that date is available. We hope to provide our readers with some "before and after" pictures of the building also.

May God bless this chapel to His glory and to the salvation of precious souls.

### Mississauga Ministry Potential

July 13, 2000

I have been asked to give a report on the potential for growth and ministry in Mississauga, Ontario, based on the numbers of people living here, and the numbers expected to move in. And the main part of that request was that I came up with some actual numbers and statistics to back up the claims of the growth forecasts here.

Of course, every mission and exploratory is going to tell you that their city is the fastest growing metro area in their county, state, province, or country. I got your attention originally by telling you that Mississauga has been the fastest growing city in North America! Though that claim may be true, since I have heard it a few times from people I would trust, I found no hard evidence to back it up. I did find hard evidence to back up the fact that it has been the fastest growing city in Canada at least since 1986, and the trend will most likely continue. There is going to be a huge growth spurt in the next few years.

Mississauga had 152,186 people in 1970, 298,045 people in 1980, 446,000 people in 1990, 574,200 people in 1998, and an estimated 588,500 people now. It is projected that there will be 618,000 people here by 2001, 652,900 people by 2006, 676,100 people by 2011, 711,800 by 2021, and 745,400 by 2031. The growth certainly looks to continue steady for a long time.

### CHURCHILL MEADOWS

The area where our parsonage is located is near the area of highest growth. There is an area just a few blocks to the south of us that is called "Churchill Meadows." It is a huge expanse of what was once farm land, and in the next 5-10 years is going to be completely developed. As you are reading this, houses are going up there faster than you can watch them be built. There are already about 100 people living in this tract of land, and that number is going to skyrocket in the next few months!

In talking to the homebuilders and developers of this area, I have heard that 1,100 homes will be completed by the end of this year, another 1,100 homes by next year, and a total of about 11,000 homes will go in there altogether. I have heard that 47,000 new families will be moving into Mississauga in the next 5-6 years from other sources.

Then I went to City Hall and dug up the following statistics which are about the same, but probably more official. You have received copies of all this information in the packet I sent you. In the Churchill Meadows district alone, 100 people live there now. 1,500 people will live there by the end of 2001, 11,100 people by the end of 2006, 23,700 people by 2011, 33,500 by 2016, and 41,500 people by 2021! This is our main target area. According to the city statistics, there will be almost 12,000 houses on this piece of real estate by the year 2021. If we would want to build a church here, we would already have to apply for a plot of land to be "re-zoned." But it would be much easier sooner than later.

You can see all of these same numbers on the data I am sending you. Check out the "Mississauga Growth Forecasts" for "Population Growth" and "Housing Growth." Also be sure to check out the "Mississauga – Demographics" packet for more detail. Besides Churchill Meadows, there are a few other

districts that we could and have done work in, that are also growing like wildfire. The church office is in the "Lisgar" district, which is also going to be growing quite a bit, but not as much, since it is already quite built in. It will add 10,700 people by 2021. The "Meadowvale Village" and "City Centre" districts should also grab your attention. Meadowvale Village is going to add 29,600 people by 2021. There is also going to be a lot of growth in the City Centre, right around the Living Arts Centre, where we currently worship. It should add 19,000 people by 2021, and could be quite the area for some multicultural work.

### **MULTICULTURAL ISSUES**

That brings us to the next very important issue about doing our mission work in this city. Mississauga is a very multicultural city! English-speaking Caucasian Canadians are not in the majority in the entire make-up of Mississauga. It is filled with people from all over the globe. It has high populations of East Indians, Chinese, South Asians, Portuguese, Scottish, Irish, Italian, Polish, French, Filipinos, Jamaicans, and even a few Germans. That is only the beginning of the list! Take a look at Table 1 in the 1996 Census Update – Ethnic Origin and Visible Minorities" packet that I sent. Mississauga is a mini New York City, but with a higher percentage of East Indians. Mississauga is very similar to Toronto, but even has higher percentages of some "minorities."

The churches that are doing well here have established some pretty well-run "multicultural ministries." They are having services in other languages and incorporating music and traditions from other cultures. The Mississauga Gospel Temple (MGT) and Grace Community Church are two such examples. They are quite large and have become well-known in the community.

People are coming here all from all over Canada, the World, and even some from the U.S. They aren't just moving across town. Mississauga also is establishing itself as a cultural center for arts, and as a place of big business. The economy looks to be strong (see that packet) and will have new businesses coming in steadily over the next 20 years. The only problem Mississauga is going to have is how they are going to handle all the traffic! Right now, just as many people commute to Mississauga from Toronto and other places to work as the number of Mississaugans who commute to Toronto to work. It is not a bedroom community, but a growing, diverse, multi-cultural city that has demonstrated a pride in itself and a dedication to be run well and organized. It has been running "in the black" for years, thanks to eighty-something year old Mayor Hazel McCallion. ### THEREFORE...

Throwing one pastor into Mississauga to reach its thousands of lost would be like one soldier landing on Normandy beach on D-Day. And there are a lot of "lost" here. One of the pastors from MGT told me that if ten percent of Mississauga actually went to church on Sunday morning, there would not be room for them in the church buildings here. We could obviously use a "ministry team" here in Mississauga. (I realize that most likely, so could everybody at all of our other missions. I do not ever intend to assert that we have a greater need here or deserve more help). But if it is the Lord's will that more manpower could be made available for our mission work here to meet these needs, I would suggest a few of the following possibilities...

### WE COULD USE...

A FULL-TIME PASTOR - He would split duties with me, and we would be able to do twice as much.

A FULL-TIME PASTOR — Some outgoing, people person with almost a salesman-like ability to get people to talk and listen. This pastor could spearhead the calling, canvassing, survey work part of the job, as well as get his feet in the door for follow-up work. The other pastor, (me maybe) might do the lions' share of the teaching classes, preaching, administration, etc. In other words, break up duties and find out which pastors did which best and then use our strengths. I like this possibility a lot more than the top one, where we would both be doing the same thing, but more of it with two.

A FULL-TIME STAFF MINISTER – He would do all the above that a staff minister could do. I would help him and handle the preaching and more of the other "pastoral" duties. He could also help with teaching.

**A FULL-TIME LAY MINISTER** — Once again, he would do all of the above, and I would help him as well as handle the "pastoral" duties.

**A FULL-TIME STAFF MINISTER** – This one would spearhead a VBS program, youth ministry, Day-care, nursery, and help get some or all of these things going as mission arms here. I would be able to continue to do more of what I am doing now with all those added components.

**A WELS TEACHER** – He (or she) would do the same as the one above – get child and youth ministry going full speed.

**A WELS TEACHER** – He would work on beginning a Christian Day School (an LES) here in Canada! That would be innovative and quite popular here! They need help with schools!

A PASTOR, TEACHER, STAFF OR LAY MINISTER with expertise in getting some multicultural (or even in one other culture) ministry going would be very helpful. Someone who could work with me to stretch beyond the normal thing that we are so far attempting to do here in Mississauga.

**NAME ANOTHER POSSIBILITY...** There are probably plenty of other possibilities that I have not come across. But I think we need to think beyond the norm. Hope Church in Scarborough is doing a good job, I believe, of incorporating some unique elements into their ministry. And their team ministry has probably helped a lot. Any help that we could get could be used in some way or other to multiply our efforts to reach the lost here.

Keep us in your prayers, that our probing leads us to lost souls, no matter how many we have doing the work here. Keep praying that the Lord will lead the people we have to serve to their best abilities to share that message, and that He would lead others to the faith who would also have talents to serve in His kingdom. Pray that He will bless our faithful preaching of his Word here to bring people to know their Savior through that wonderful Gospel. God's grace is certainly amazing! May we never tire of sharing it with those who need it as desperately as we do!

Those of us "out here" always greatly appreciate the wonderful work that the Mission Board does, and the help, support, and prayers you give us! May God bless you and guide you as you continue your Kingdom work!

# A Brief History of CROSS OF LIFE LUTHERAN CHURCH The Exploratory in OAKVILLE / MISSISSAUGA, ONTARIO

In the early 1980's, a mission was begun in Mississauga, a large and growing city right to the west of Toronto, Ontario. A building was purchased, in which the group worshiped until about 1987. The mission closed down at that point. But, since Mississauga began to be one of the fastest growing cities not only in Canada, but in all of North America, efforts were made to get manpower back into this metro area.

Pastor Doug Priestap was called into the area to begin helping Pastor Tom Haar, who was working to the east of Toronto's metro area. In 1990, Pastor Priestap began doing mission work in the town of Bolton, Ontario, and he, his wife Doris, and his three daughters lived in a house there. The congregation named itself "Good Shepherd." The next shift came when Pastor Priestap began reaching out to the town of Oakville (population 127,000). Together with some of the souls who were being served in the first Mississauga mission, he began gathering prospects in this city, which is just west of Mississauga.

In 1994, the present group was formed with Bible studies in the homes of Marguerite Rouleau, and Roberto and Denise Tempesta. The congregation now took on the name "Cross of Life," a suggestion from Mr. Tempesta. At this time, Pastor Priestap was still living in Bolton and commuting to Oakville to serve this group. In August of 1995, with the help of the Synod, the group was able to rent a Christian Information Centre, a storefront building on Kerr Street in downtown Oakville. The Information Centre was set up to offer religious and Biblical literature to the community as a way to establish contacts and share the Gospel. The group also worshiped regularly in the storefront, and gained a number of neighbourhood members and visitors. Cross of Life had around 25 members.

In August of 1997, the Kerr Street storefront was closed down. Cross of Life continued to meet at Glen Abbey Recreation Centre in the northern section of Oakville. They began doing mission work in that part of town at that time. Pastor and his family moved to Oakville and began renting a parsonage on Callaghan Crescent. In December of 1998, Pastor Priestap took a call and his farewell service was on Christmas Eve of that year. Pastor Ed Herman from Hope Lutheran in Scarborough covered the vacancy by leading Sunday morning worship services and Tuesday evening Bible classes in the vacated parsonage. There were about a dozen or so attending at this time.

The Mission Board had hope to get two men working in this metro area, but with the shortage of pastors, it seemed only feasible to call one pastor – which they hoped to receive from Assignment Day in Mequon, Wisconsin. Pastor Joel Schulz was given the assignment after completing two years of tutoring at Michigan Lutheran Seminary in Saginaw, Michigan. He and his wife Dawn moved to Canada in the summer of 1999, and he was installed on August 15. Since the Mission Board could only get one man into this area, they had to choose which field – Oakville or Mississauga? They chose Mississauga, because now, among other reasons, Mississauga at 575,000 people is the fastest growing city in North America, and is largely unchurched. So, Pastor Schulz was called to serve as a Mission Explorer in Mississauga, with the intention of beginning with the Oakville-based Cross of Life core group.

The first step in the "move" to Mississauga was getting a new worship facility. The Lord blessed the group with a nice rented facility in the Living Arts Centre, a civic centre in the middle of Mississauga. The core group of 25 members has gone along with the move to Mississauga, and are ready to begin the next task the Lord has given them – sharing the Gospel in this growing, culturally diverse, large city. The parsonage was moved into Mississauga this spring, right into the middle of an area that is supposed to see **47,000 new families** move into it in one year's time. The harvest is most certainly plentiful! Pray that God bless our ministry of sharing his love with so many people who don't know Him here in Mississauga!

He brought 20 children to the local grade school we rented to hear the good news. Only two of those were our members! The day went wonderful, and with God's help, we shared the message through lessons, videos, crafts, games, and singing. The event concluded with all of the parents showing up for a closing service in which the children shared the message with them.

Christmas is for children! "Children" include all of those who believe His Word with a child's heart moved by the Holy Spirit. Our goal is to help more of the diverse people in our area realize that since Christmas is for children, it is for them!

# Something deeper shared


It is a hot afternoon in July. A group of young kids is on a soccer field working on drills. They come from all sorts of backgrounds and have different colors of skin but the same blue T-shirts. Coaches encourage the kids and point out how they could do better.

Then, you hear a long whistle. "Grab a drink," the coaches tell the kids, "It is time to head to the bleachers for the Bible lesson!"

What? Bible lesson? I thought this was a soccer camp! It was. But it was also a Bible camp—Cross of Life's Soccer/Bible Camp, the first ever for this exploratory mission in Mississauga, Ontario.

The idea for a soccer camp hit me as I was jogging past the city soccer fields in the middle of our target area—a densely populated suburban neigh-

rhood with many young families with little children. Soccer is popular among the youth here. Parents are paying \$150 for one-week soccer camps! My wife and I played soccer

in college. I am even coaching a team now. Why not have a soccer camp where we also teach the children about Jesus?

And that is what we did. WELS Kingdom Workers recruited an eightperson team of coaches and helpers. We advertised with road signs and mailings, clearly indicating that we would be teaching kids about Jesus, but that we would also be practicing soccer skills. We charged \$15 to help cover costs, including T-shirts, water bottles, soccer balls, cones, jerseys, pumps, canopies, and a bunch of other things normally not in church budgets. Finally we spent some late nights preparing drills, game plans, devotions, skits, and lessons.

The Lord certainly blessed this program. Eighty-four children registered. And we averaged 80 kids every day! We had a lot of fun, and we believe that the kids got the messages we shared with them about Jesus.

The motto of the camp was "Soccer skills taught—something deeper shared." We illustrated each message about Jesus by using soccer skills and game situations. Good soccer was played, and good discussions were held about sin and grace and our wonderful Savior.

Through this program, we are getting the opportunity to share Jesus with a larger crowd. You see, none of the 84 children were members of our church. Many of them had never heard of Jesus. We added prospects to our list and got some positive exposure in our community. Most important, we were given an effective way to share the gospel with 80 kids each day. We know God will work through that Word.

Many parents remarked that they got a great deal out of this. We think their kids got a great deal! But the best thing we heard was when we asked an eight-year-old what her favorite part was. Her answer? "The pastor's messages about Jesus."

# Day 2 – Tuesday, July 17

# "Dribbling"

### 1:00 - 1:15 ROLL CALL

- We will give 15 minutes to everyone to get here and be ready to go. Trust me, it will take this long. We will check off each child as they get here. If we can start earlier, great!

### 1:15 - 1:30 WARM-UP AND STRETCHING

- Each age group will divide up and do an Indian Run around the field twice. We may call it something different than that. I will demonstrate it.
- Each group leader leads their group in full round of stretches. Make sure they stretch well. We don't want muscle pulls.

#### 1:30 - 1:45 "DRIBBLING"

- All the age groups will be brought together and led in a presentation on dribbling by me (Pastor Schulz).(have kids get water) The basic concept I will try to teach is *control*. The object of dribbling is to make sure that the ball never gets too far in front of you. You always want to stay "hooked up" to it. We will demonstrate the difference between what happens when someone is dribbling well, and how easy it is for the defender to steal the ball when it is far out in front of you.

### 1:45 – 3:00 DRILLS WORKING ON DRIBBLING (With a water break in the middle)

Each age group will split up and work on appropriate drills that practice dribbling. We will set out cones and have them weave through them. We can have races between different "teams." We will teach the 3-person weave with the older groups. We will have some keep-away type offense/defense drills. Have two people trying to keep it away from each other. Have the "go for the ball" drill. Other drills...

#### 3:00 - 3:30 SOMETHING DEEPER FROM THE BIBLE

- Kids can all get water bottles and oranges and rest in the shade. Pastor will teach a Bible truth about staying hooked up to the Word of God. With dribbling, it is SO important for you to keep ball near you, stay hooked up with it! If it gets too far away, someone will snatch it up! Demonstrate this with volunteer participant. Devotion on the Parable of the Sower (Matthew 13:1-23) with application to John 15, to teach the lesson of how important it is for us to stay hooked up with Jesus through his Word. Unlike dribbling, when you are hooked up closely with the Word, ON ONE can take that away from you! It doesn't matter whether you are Pele' or a beginner. It all depends on God and his grace!

### 3:30 - 4:00 SCRIMMAGE!

Divide into teams with various age groups, hand out pennys, have group leaders involved, and play a scrimmage for the rest of the day, stressing dribbling and ball-handling. We can also build on the rules we learned yesterday.

### 4:00 PM DISMISSAL (hand out treats, talk with parents, invite kids to Bible Camp)

### \* Note to all Group Leaders:

Make sure the kids get plenty of water all during the day. Let's try to schedule regular water breaks, and have all the water bottles in one place so that it limits our down time. But don't deny a kid water who needs it. We aren't at preseason football camp. Above all, be watching in your groups that each participant is playing and practicing safely. Quickly settle disputes, if we would ever run into a problem there. Let's not take any chances on letting injuries happen that could be avoided.

# Cross of Life Soccer Camp Message Day 4, July 11, 2002

### "THE CROSS"

Texts Used: Matthew 27:45-54, John 3:16, Romans 3, 1 John 2:2

How is everyone doing so far? Having fun? Great — we should be having fun! Soccer is a game — it is supposed to be fun! Our life, on the other hand, is more important than a game. Many things about life are very serious. But life can also be fun. It is fun when we have Jesus in our lives! In order to make it *fun*, though, Jesus had to do something very *serious*. It is time to have our talk about soccer and Jesus again...

How many of you saw the World Cup Final: Brazil v. Germany? (response) What an exciting game that was! There was one offensive play that both of those teams used so well that gave them many chances to score goals. Do you know what that play was? (response) It was the "CROSS." How many of you know what a "cross" in soccer is? (response) A cross is when one of the players on your team kicks the ball all the way from the side of the field into the middle of the field, right in front of the goal, where your forwards are waiting to head or kick it into the goal. It normally arches up over the heads of the defenders so they can't stop it. If the cross is placed just right, there is nothing the defenders can do about it. In soccer, a good cross is very effective in scoring goals and winning the game! Have coaches demonstrate good and bad crosses. The defenders can humorously get all bungled up when the ball goes over their heads.

In soccer, a good cross is very effective in winning the game. In life, the CROSS is absolutely necessary to win the game! Do you know which cross I am talking about? (response) That's right, I am talking about the cross that Jesus had to die on. Do you know why? Let me tell you why with a story...

Once upon a time, there was a very powerful king. Whenever he made a law, the people followed it. He was wise and loving and fair and just. He took care of his people, was fair to them, and in turn, they liked him a lot too. He loved his family and took care of his aging, frail queen mother, who was very sick. He was a good king. One day, this king made a law that on a certain day of the year, every one of his subjects should give something to the poor to help them out. And if anyone refused to obey this law, they would be handcuffed in the town square in front of all the people, and be publicly whipped. So the king made the law and everyone obeyed it. Everyone, that is, except for his poor, frail, old mother. She broke the law. And the king said that anyone who broke the law would have to be beaten. What could the king do? If he had his mother whipped, she would die, because that would be too much for her to take. And that wouldn't be showing a lot of love! But if he didn't, then that wouldn't be showing a lot of justice? Who would obey the king's laws anymore? He would no longer be a just king! So what did the king do? How could he be both loving and fair? Do you know what he did? He put himself in handcuffs in the town square for everyone to see, and then had himself publicly whipped. He took the beating for his mother, so she wouldn't have to! This way, he showed both his love and his fairness! And the people loved him even more!

This is what God did for us with the cross. God is fair and just – He demands that we be perfect and make no mistakes. And if we aren't perfect, He says that the punishment will be death in hell. But God is also very loving! He wants us to be in heaven with Him forever! Well, just like the king's mother, you and I have disobeyed God. We have not been nice to our parents, friends, brothers, sisters, and neighbors. We have not always put God first in our lives. So God should punish us, right? He has to, because He is fair and just. But God loves us way too much to punish us with death and separate us from Him! He wants us to be in heaven with Him! So what could He do? Just like that king, He took the punishment out on Himself! He took the punishment out on his own Son, Jesus, so that He wouldn't have to take it out on us. Jesus came here to die on a CROSS to pay the punishment for all those sins of ours, so that God could still be just and fair, but so that God could also show how much He loves us! He knew that we could have never survived that punishment, just like the king's mother couldn't. So He took it himself on the CROSS.

In soccer, a good cross is very effective in winning the game. In life, the CROSS that Jesus died on is absolutely necessary for you and I to "win the game"! That cross was the way that God could still be fair and show how much He loves you and me! That cross is the thing that shows how much God loves us! That cross is the thing that guarantees that God and us are on good terms now and that we will be in heaven forever! I once asked Jesus how much He loved me. "This much?" I asked. He stretched his arms out wide and said, "This is how much I love you!" This is how much Jesus loves each of you! This is what He was willing to do for you! The cross means that you will be with Him forever!

# Finding the common denominator

t's Friday night. Reggae music is playing in the background. People are talking and laughing. Some begin moving to the beat. Soon everyone in the room—including a 75-year-old Romanian man—is dancing to the island music.

What doesn't belong here? (This is a trick question!) Actually nothing and no one is out of place. This is a typical gathering for Cross of Life, Mississauga, Ontario, Canada, a mission congregation of 63 members from more than 12 different nationalities.

Although members come from various cultures and races, they all have something in common—faith in their Savior and the desire to spread that faith into the diverse, multicultural city of Mississauga.

### Finding the right location

Located right outside of Toronto, Mississauga is considered one of the fastest growing cities in Canada due to the number of immigrants settling in the area. Houses are being built by the thousands to accommodate the people. But the neighborhoods aren't defined by culture.

"All different people from all different races are really scattered around," says Joel Schulz, pastor at Cross of Life. "Down most of our streets, it's hard to find three houses in a row of people with the same skin color, culture, or racial background."

Holding worship services in its target neighborhood provides common ground to the community-minded group of Cross of Life's members and prospects.

Yet Schulz didn't know this when he first came to Mississauga in 1999. He was assigned to restart an exploratory that had been working out of the neighboring community of Oakville. To stay close to existing members, he began holding worship in a plush civic center in downtown Mississauga, about 15 minutes away from his target neighborhood.

Schulz invited people to services, used Travel-Canvass-Witness teams, and "basically became a telemarketer." Although it was building its prospect list, Cross of Life only had about 30 to 40 visitors in the first year and a half. "We were too far away," says

Schulz. "We thought we needed a 'nice' place to meet, but [prospects] didn't care what the building looked like. They wanted something they could walk to."

When the church had no visitors on Christmas Eve 2000, members decided that night that the church needed a new location.

Two months later Cross of Life began holding services in a school gym in the middle of its target area. New visitors came every week in that first month. Since then Cross of Life has had hundreds of visitors each year and is well-known in its community.

### **Building** relationships

But it didn't become well-known overnight. Moving into the target neighborhood helped, but the members needed to gain trust and build relationships with the people whom they were serving. Because the church's neighborhood had more kids age seven and under than any other Toronto neighborhood, the congregation knew that it needed to reach out to the children.

After having several successful one-day programs for neighborhood children, the church's prospect list continued to grow. But Schulz felt that something more was needed. In spring 2001, he came up with the idea of having an event that would appeal to all cultures—a one-week soccer/Bible camp. By interspersing soccer


drills with Bible truths, Schulz and members of a Travel-Canvass-Witness team reached 85 children with the truth about Jesus and strengthened the church's community image.

Those children then shared the message of God's truth with their parents, and some of those parents began attending Bible information classes. Three families joined the church; others are still in classes. Plans are in place for the fourth annual camp this summer.

### Showing love

While all these things may have helped get their foot in the door, God's true Word and members filled with love for each other and the lost keep people coming back.


Lloyd Stacey, who was formerly unchurched, attended Cross of Life for the first time when his sister and brother-in-law were visiting him and encouraged him to attend. He went back the following week. "My eyes were opened as if for the first time," says Stacey. "I can recall a voice inside me saying, 'Where have you been all this time? You need to be here!' I have had a hunger for God's Word ever since."



Lester Chandoo never went to church in Trinidad because "at home, church was a big fashion show." He attended several churches after he and his wife moved to Canada in the mid 1980s. But only after he took Bible information classes at Cross of Life did he see the whole truth and feel the love of his Savior and his family in Christ. "It's different to see the joy and fellowship that you have on a Sunday and even on days other than Sunday," says Chandoo. "[In other churches] people invite you because they know what you do or who you are. They don't invite you because you're a person. Here you're treated like people."

And you're treated like friends. "We have fellowship every Sunday after worship, and I can see and feel genuine love," says Stacey. Members and prospects also regularly get together during the week for fellowship

events—or just for dinner. Members are excited about the Word and are making connections with others so they can share their joy.

### Plans for the future

In September 2003, Cross of Life entered the Mission Development Phase of the Board for Home Missions and is on its way to being self-supporting. Members are excited by the news: "It provides me with a level of comfort that my new church is going to be around, and I don't have to worry about looking for another one," says Stacey.

But challenges still abound. The school gymnasium works well for worship, but Schulz and Staff Minister Kevin Walker hold all meetings, Bible classes, and some fellowship events in their homes. If classes keep growing, space will become an issue. Even though a land search committee has been formed, land is scarce, so scarce that hardly any churches in Mississauga have their own building. Prices are high as well, with four or five acres of land costing millions of dollars.

Yet the zeal for saving souls continues to bring this diverse group together. "It's exciting seeing God's Word work," says Schulz, "not only as we grow in numbers but also as we grow in faith."

"What is your question, Alfonso?"


He answered, "I never would have believed it, until I read it. Jesus has the power to exorcise demons! I thought that only the priest could do that."

 $O^{\mathrm{ne}}$  of the newest schools in our church body is also taking a new approachnot to education, but to purpose, objective, and funding. Divine Savior Academy (DSA) in Doral (Miami), Fla., opened in 2004 with an enrollment of 33 children. Many blessings have ensued. For the 2006-07 school year we anticipate an opening enrollment of 145-150 students ranging from K4 through sixth grade. Each year we will add another grade, DSA had originally planned to stop at the eighth grade (end of middle school). However, reflecting the wishes of the parents and the community, new plans are to

extend the school through the 12th grade.

There is more to DSA than just serving as a great educational institution. From the beginning, the purpose of the school has been to be an outreach arm of the congregation. There have been baptisms, and some families are once again connecting with Christ

There are a number of external aspects that make DSA different from many WELS schools. Miami is a culturally diverse city. Latinos are by far the majority population, and the school reflects that. The student body comes from the Pacific Rim, Europe, almost all the countries of South and Central America, not to mention many of the Caribbean Islands. Altogether, over 25 nationalities are represented. All the children at Divine Savior Academy wear uniforms. DSA is a tuition-based school and is completely selfsupporting.

Initial survey work indicated that the community was looking for high quality education in a safe and moral environment. Joel,

Thank you for all the information, and your help. I hope all your Christmas preparations are going well. And after writing the majority of this paper I have been thinking a lot about your congregation which has meant so much to both me and my wife. I have a couple more questions for you. Mostly concerning Milton. What factors led to the opportunity into Milton?

One of the main ways we have made and strengthened initial contacts with prospects is our worship service. It has proved to be the thing that people feel they need to "check out" before getting further in ministry with our church. And over the years, it has developed into something that has been a very positive thing for visitors - our visitors have enjoyed it with about a 95% approval rating. (earthly kind of numbers there) But of course God has been able to speak to outreach prospects through our worship service and message we give. we put a lot of effort into it. and so, why not do it TWICE? A second time in a different area, to a different group of people?

Right to the west of us is Milton, the now fastest growing city in Canada. A few of our own members have moved there. One of them is quite the accomplished musician. So the idea grew that maybe she could do the music part, and I could bring the service and the sermon, and we could do a Sunday afternoon or evening service as an outreach effort in this new neighbourhood. It would not be a new congregation - but more of a second service, and and outreach arm for Cross of Life. Same Sermon. Same Service. New music. And once we got it up and running, it wouldn't take too much more effort than just doing what we do now, but doing it again for more fruit.

We were able to get a few grants from the BHM and from our own district to get the needed advertising and promotion and equipment to put on the new worship service. And we found a decent time and place to carry it out on. Our people were very enthusiastic for the idea and agreed to come and join the effort for the first month...

We began on September 17, 2006 in the Milton Leisure Centre at 4:00 pm on Sundays.

### What kind of response has the opening of Milton received?

Not huge, humanly speaking. We had a grand opening service with about 50 people. Then for the first month, it settled down to about 30 people, since some of ours were coming to two services to help get it going. Currently we have about 15-20 a Sunday, with a couple real Milton prospects coming each week. So it is a relatively small and informal thing now, but we do have a few prospects through it and it also gives our people who can't make the morning service another chance to worship on Sunday. It has got our people re-excited about outreach as well - that we can help get a mission effort started. It isn't bearing huge fruit, humanly speaking, but the people who are regular want to keep it going, and with God's help, we will. Who knows what He has planned.

### Are there any new leads on buying land to build?

Why yes, there is. We are currently trying to put together a bid to buy a 2 acre piece of land with a very usable church building on it! It is 2.3 miles east of our house, and may sell for around 1.8 to 2.0 million. The bids will be accepted on February 19, 2007, and I am sure many churches and businesses will be bidding for it. So nothing is set, but we are working on a CEF loan application right now. The idea would be that we would work the new Glen Erin neighbourhood, just as we did the Milton neighbourhood with all sorts of promotion about our church moving in, and there is a potential this could be a new target area for us along with our Lisgar target area. The Soccer Camp would stay at Lisgar fields for now, but there are a field full of soccer pitches right behind this new church property!

### One general question:

What has been the most challenging aspect of doing mission work in the Mississauga? The devil. The way that he has got into peoples hearts and turned them off so against God and his messengers and the Christian church. And then when he gets into the hearts and lives of your own people and try to run you off course that is a distraction to your mission....

But humanly speaking... CULTURAL barriers... RELIGIOUS barriers... the diversity of world religions here - the ugliness of the Canadian Christian churches and how that has turned people against them and made them distrust them - the fact that it is very hard to approach people about faith here - the fact that it takes a long time to build relationships and figure out how it is you are going to get the Gospel to them - the spirit of ecumenism here and the "we all believe in the same God" stuff... You can't really do anything like you learned it in school.. the basic challenge was just figuring out... OK I have this wonderful message to share... how can I share it with these people? (People who have no kind of background at all like the kind of background I have)
